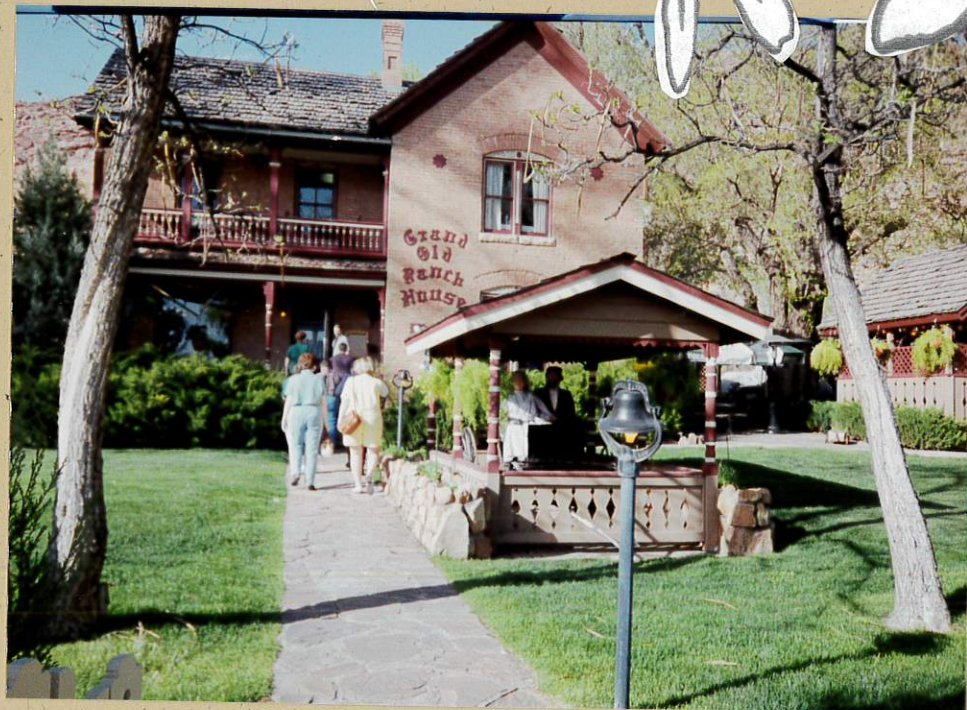
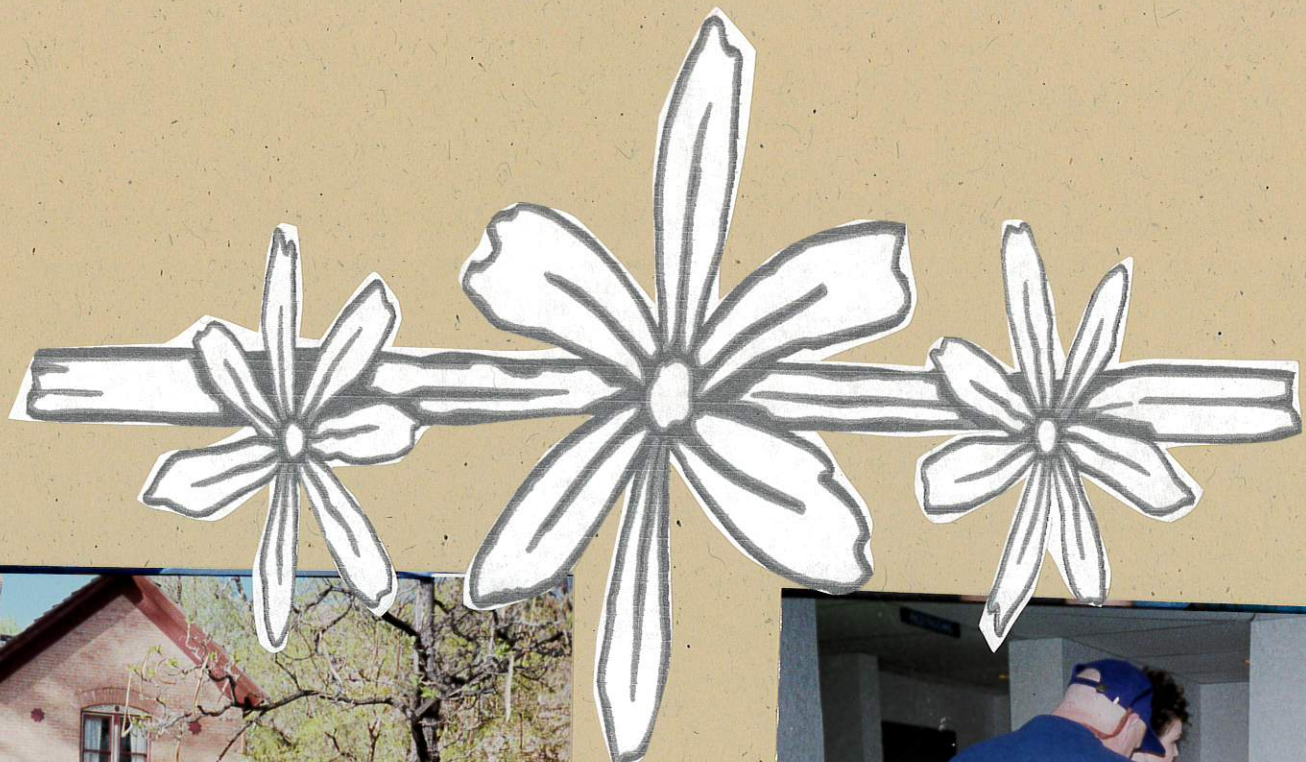
The Utah Municipal Clerks Association assists and trains all clerks and recorders throughout the state, keeping them abreast of the various changing laws and current issues.

Nancy L. Jorgensen

GUNNISON, Utah—Our kind and beloved mother, daughter, sister, and aunt, Nancy Lee Miller Jorgensen, age 41, of Gunnison, died Saturday, April 25, 1998, in an automobile accident on I-70, north of Sigurd, Utah.



She was born September 22, 1956 at Kindley AFB in the Bermuda Islands, a daughter of Alfred Paul and Dorothy Cunningham Miller. She and her brothers and sisters formed an entertaining group, called "The Young Folk" when they were growing up in Bermuda. They would perform for the people on the islands and they also cut a record. Nancy graduated from Roger B. Chaffey High School in Bermuda, Class of 1974. She attended BYU. She married Jerry Rulon Jorgensen of Sigurd, Utah, on June 27, 1975 in the Mantil LDS Temple. They were blessed with two daughters and two sons. They were later divorced. She married Kent Lenon on July 23, 1993 in Pleasant Grove, Utah. They were divorced. Nancy moved to Gunnison in 1975 where she has since lived and made her home. She worked for Gunnison City as the City Clerk and Recorder. She became a vital and active member of the community, receiving many awards in her work with the city. She was honored on March 2, 1998 by the Utah Municipal Clerks Association for being accepted in the First Sustaining Membership of the UMC Academy for Advanced Education. Only 12 percent of the 10,000 members of the International Institute of Municipal Clerks have achieved this status.

Nancy was an active member of the LDS Church and was currently serving as Activities Committee Chairperson in the Gunnison 2nd Ward. She enjoyed going to the Temple and doing genealogy. She was a very dedicated mother and was very involved with her children's activities. She will be greatly missed.

Survived by her children: Jared G. Jorgensen, of Ephraim; Lisa Marie Jorgensen, of Cedar City; Daniel R. Jorgensen and Lindsay Ray Jorgensen, both of Gunnison; her mother, Dorothy C. Miller, of Gunnison; sisters and brothers: Phyllis Ann and Gary Krutinger, of Austin, TX; William Eastman, of Woodruff, UT; Judy and Jerald Dastrop, of Sigurd; Patricia and George Gilliam, of Plano, TX; Mary Elizabeth and John Carlson, of Springville; Mark E. and Cheryl Miller, of Gunnison; her mother and father-in-law: Bonnie and Joe Jorgensen, of Sigurd. She was preceded in death by a sister, Connie Miller Eastman, and her father, Alfred Paul Miller, who died in February of 1997 as the result of an automobile accident.

Funeral service will be held Friday, May 1, 1998, at 12 noon in the Gunnison LDS Stake Center, 80 West Center Street in Gunnison, where friends may call for viewing Thursday evening from 7 to 9 p.m. and Friday from 10 to 11:30 prior to the service. Burial will be in the Gunnison City Cemetery under the direction of the Springer Turner Funeral Home of Richfield and Salina, Utah.

Freak Storm Causes Mishap

An automobile accident about one-half mile east of the Sigurd/Vermillion exit on I-70 claimed the life of Nancy Jorgensen (41) of Gunnison, Saturday, April 25. A weird weather pattern created an isolated hailstorm for about a half-mile stretch near the Rocky Ford Canal as it intersects with I-70.

Lisa Jorgensen (20) was driving the car accompanied by her mother, Nancy, and sister, Lindsay (12), eastbound on I-70 when they hit the patch of hail. The car hydroplaned on the icy roads sending it spinning in the right-hand lane of traffic.

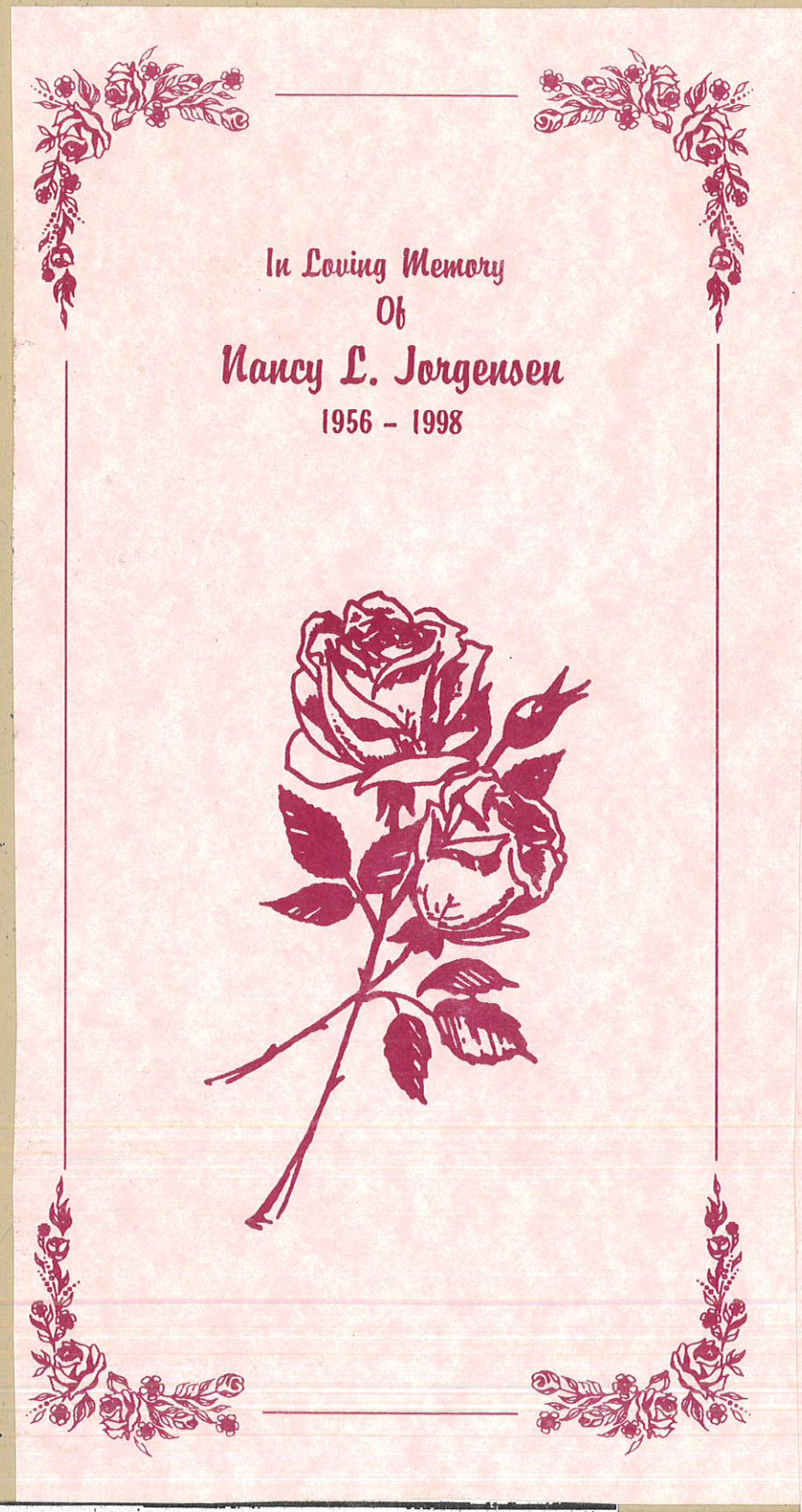
An oncoming Dodge Ram truck pulling a 30-foot travel trailer collided with the passenger's side of the Jorgensen car where Nancy was sitting, and pushed it about 100 yards before coming to a stop in the bar pit on the right-hand side of the road. A third car swerved off the road to avoid the accident.

Lisa was transported to Utah Valley Hospital, Payson, in critical condition with internal injuries. Her condition was later upgraded to stable on Monday and according to a family member, Lisa was expected to be released late Tuesday. Lindsay was treated for minor injuries at Gunnison Valley Hospital.

Nancy was pronounced dead at the scene. Emergency Medical Technicians and the Salina City Fire Department worked for approximately 15 minutes to extricate her from the vehicle. According to the EMT's at the scene, evidence indicated that her death was probably instantaneous.

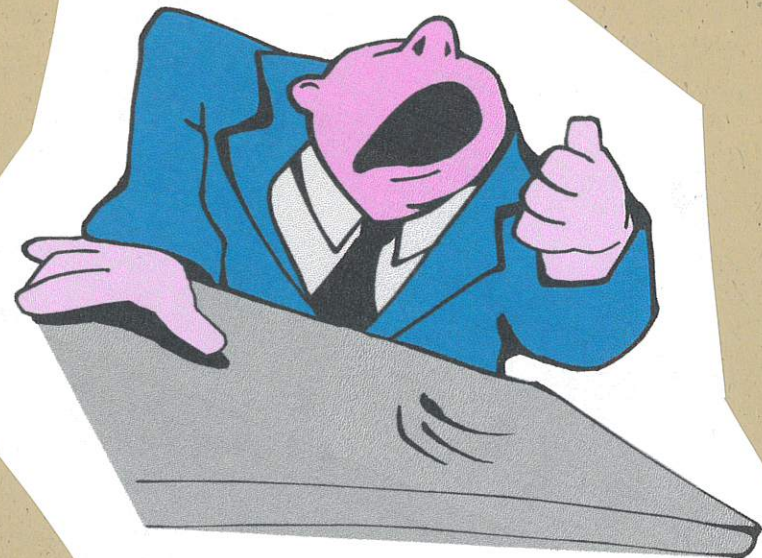
The Dodge truck was driven by Robert Hamilton of Montana. He was accompanied by his wife, Maria. They were transported in the ambulance and treated for minor injuries.

By 6 p.m., when the accident was all but cleared, the sun was shining and there was no remaining hail on the road. Trooper Joe Reynolds, investigating officer, said that he had just come from I-70 and this was the only part of the road that was like that.

Municipal clerks group honors Churchfield

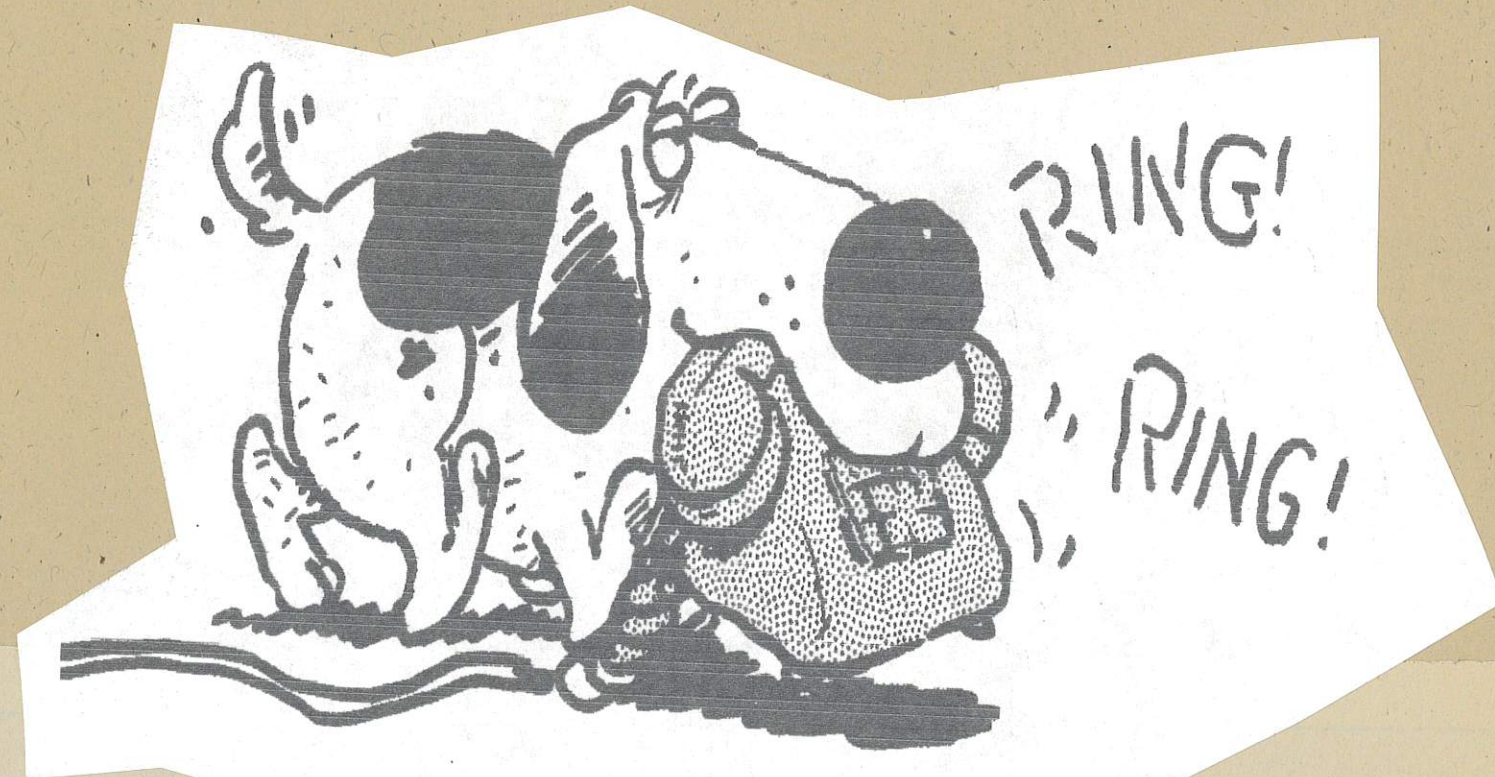

Farmington City to honor retiree

FARMINGTON - An open house honoring retiring city Finance Director/Recorder Dona Scharp will be Friday from noon to 3 p.m. at the Farmington City Offices, 130 N. Main.

Scharp began her career with Farmington City in March 1982 when the city only had utility bills and payroll on the computer system.

"She has brought order out of chaos," said Max Forbush, city manager. "As the city has grown, the number of financial transactions has grown. She has handled that while developing an accounting system that has been very efficient. She has helped to guide us during this high growth time."

"Donna is always looking to the future and planning for the city," said Lynette Bingham, Farmington City treasurer and co-worker for the past 17 years.



DONA SHARP: She began her career with Farmington City in March 1982.

"She has a lot of wisdom about what needs to be done and the direction the city should go," said Margy Lomax, executive secretary/deputy recorder and newly appointed recorder. "She is very much the professional and likes to have things done correctly. She is very innovative as far as the city is concerned and helped lead the push to move forward, rather than drag behind."

"Dona is incredible, very organized, detailed, thorough and a delight to audit," said Charles E. Ulrich of Ulrich and Associates,

Farmington City's independent auditors. "I've been auditing the city for about the past 15 years and I wish everyone would do it the way she does. Her records are well organized and documented. She's on top of her work and knows what she's doing."

When Scharp began with the city, her main concern was to computerize the city's business functions. At the time the population was about 3,500; today Farmington's population is 12,000-plus.

"There have always been challenges. Along with the growth in the city, there have also been increased regulations and mandates from the federal and state governments that impact every aspect of keeping pace, whether it's in the record keeping duties of the recorder or the accounting functions of the finance director," said Scharp.

Among the events she includes as personal achievements

is her membership as an International Certified Municipal Clerk and the Certificate of Achievement for Governmental Financial Reporting Award, an extremely involved and well respected award. The city applied for and received this certificate three years in a row.

"These past 17 years have been very positive and rewarding. It's gratifying to see all the work that goes on unnoticed behind the scenes, not only by Max, the elected officials and city workers in all departments, but by the residents of the city also," said Scharp, the mother of four children and eight grandchildren. "I greatly appreciate the unwavering support that has been given to me by my husband, Rick, and all those involved as I've tried to fulfill my responsibilities over the years."
